Issei, Nisei Entertainment Slated; Appointed Staff to Hold Bond Sale

Under the co-chairmanship of Max Barber and Shig Osawa, the Community Activities is sponsoring of Fourth of July program for the benefit of the center residents, according to Morris Roth, C. A. Supervisor. The program will include footraces, Boy Scout demonstrations, softball games and an evening entertainment period.

Huntville and Stafford grade school students will gather in their respective class rooms at 9:00 a. m. and then march to Center Field where they will participate in a flag raising ceremony. Yoshito Fujii, Community Council chairman, will give the welcome address. The program will be concluded with the singing of the Star Spangled Banner.

Footraces for students from grades 1 to 12 will be conducted at Center Field at 10:00 a. m. Flag relay, race between the Huntville and Stafford schools, fruit race, sack relay race, three-legged race, nose and toe race, peanut race, 50-yard dash, spoon and egg relay race, are among the races in which the students may participate. A tug of war will also be held.

Following the footraces the various Boy Scout troops will give demonstrations in cooking, boiling water and the building of fires.

Softball games between the Huntville and Stafford All-stars will be held at 1:30 p. m. at the following fields: Boys, Center Field; Girls, Field 23.

A talent-packed entertainment program with the clever emceeing of Tura Nakamura will be given in the evening for issei and nisei alike at Center Field. Vocal solos, Japanese and American dancing numbers and short skits by various clubs will be on tab for the evening.

Those working on this Fourth of July Program are: Shig Osawa and Max Barber, co-chairman; Tad Muraoka and Shig Ishikawa, assistant, and the Community Activities Division.

With Frank S. Barrett as general chairman, the members of the appointed personnel will observe Fourth of July with a day's program of activities.

The afternoon program will consist of games and foot races at the administration recreation hall.

Dancing will round off the program in the evening at the Ad dining hall. In conjunction with the day's activities, the appointed staff will launch the fifth war bond drive.

Calif. Group Backs Return

150 Letters Sent To War Department Promise Evacuee Aid

PASADENA—Members of the Friends of the American Way have sent 150 letters to the War Department promising homes, aid in finding employment and a spirit of genuine friendship when the government permits Japanese Americans to return to the West Coast.

These letters, according to Mrs. Jerome W. MacNair, promise 50 jobs and 125 homes, temporary or permanent, to "our former neighbors."

The letters were the result of action by a small, informal group in attempting a social experiment by sampling the sentiment of the Pasadena community. Goodwill, inarticulate and undergrounds, is thus rising to the surface, she said.

"Everywhere, there is community feeling to be mended and vicious legislation to be defeated by real friends of the real America," she added.

63 Ht. Mt. Men Sentenced to Serve 3 Years in Prison

Heart Mountain's 63 men who were charged with failure to report for their pre-induction physical examinations were sentenced to three years each in federal penitentiary for draft evasion Monday by United States Judge Blake Kennedy of Cheyenne, Wyoming, according to word received here.

Judge Kennedy's decision indicated that defense pleas about clarification of civil rights was without merit as an argument in the case.

Closing hours of the trial which was continued for one week were marked by an angry clash between Assistant U. S. District Attorney John C. Pickett and defense attorney Samuel Menin.

At one time when Menin interrupted Pickett's pleas, the federal attorney shouted: "Sit down or I'll set you down."

"Try it," Menin replied. "If the court will permit me, I'll do it—in short order," the prosecutor shouted.

The judge ordered Menin to sit down and Pickett continued his plea.
